"I've always been interested in health and fitness," Heather Bertauski said, "But seven years ago I had back surgery followed up with physical therapy, and that opened my eyes to a whole new field. I later decided to go back to school and enroll in the Physical Therapy Assistant program."

"Even though I knew Tony could help if I had questions, I was a little intimidated about how things would work out since I was an older student," said Heather. "But it turned out to be one of the cool things about the college – that there's such a wonderful mix of students and ages and backgrounds."

"The best thing about the college," though, was that "I always felt like the instructors, especially Lori Fischer and Lois Schwarz, had my back and wanted their students to succeed. They would do everything they possibly could to help us. They genuinely care about the students."

Q&A with Instructor Randy Grimes and Student Lauren Grant



Lauren Grant is pursuing an associate degree in TV and Media Production with an expected graduation date of December 2015. She received the S.C. Broadcasters Association Scholarship in 2014-15 and works for WCIV Channel 4 News. Randy Grimes is a faculty member in TV and Media Production.

Grimes: What motivated you to pursue an associate degree in TV and Media Production?

Grant: I have always had a passion for working behind the scenes in the entertainment industry. After working years in a career field that I didn't enjoy, I decided to research schools that offered a television broadcasting program. Trident was not only close to home, but it was also the most affordable.

What has being a student at TTC taught you about yourself?

I never imagined attending a technical school. But because TTC was so affordable I decided to bite the bullet and enroll. I have never felt more confident in my decision. TTC has taught me many things, but mainly confidence. I have taken leadership roles with organizations

on campus and also participated in public speaking at school events. I feel confident entering the workforce with the education and life lessons that I am receiving here.

What skill set did you acquire as a result of enrolling in the TV and Media Production program at Trident Technical College? I've learned many different software programs and skills since enrolling at Trident. I've learned Adobe Premiere and Audition, videography and lighting techniques, all of which I use every day in my position at News 4. I use Adobe Premiere daily to edit video for the newscasts and camera operation, and lighting is also an extremely important skill that I use. The skills that you learn at TTC prepare you to be industry-ready.

What was the experience like of serving as hostess for the 2015 MLK Consortium Program as well as the 2015 Black History Opening Celebration? It was an awesome

experience. I learned so much about myself. I have always been confident, but since participating in those programs my level of confidence has heightened. They were both great events, and I was honored to be a part of them.

How has your family background affected the way you think about college and the world? My family background has definitely affected the way I think about college. I am from a family that has successful careers, but they are all local. I know that I will be successful as well, but on a broader scale. My career goals expand way beyond South Carolina.

What impact did the TTC Foundation scholarship have on you financially?

I have been financing my college education with grants and student loans. This scholarship definitely impacted me financially. This scholarship will assist me in purchasing equipment so that I am able to stay current on industry trends and also start building my equipment inventory.

After graduation, what are your career plans? I will continue to gain as much experience as possible learning all areas of production with the news station. I will eventually launch a production company, LCG Productions, LLC, to create hit television shows and become known as a female media mogul!



President's Message – Dr. Mary Thornley



With the average annual aerospace employment growth at 11.4 percent since 2010 (compared to an average annual growth of other companies

of 1.4 percent) and hundreds of students on the waiting lists to get into TTC's Aeronautical Studies programs, the development of the S.C. Aeronautical Training Center is an essential and timely project for our region. The aerospace industry now employs nearly 54,000 people in South Carolina, with the highest concentration of aerospace employment in Berkeley, Charleston and Dorchester counties.

The proposed training center to be built on TTC's Main Campus will include: 165,000 square feet of

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students and leaders

classrooms, shops, and labs; 50,000 square feet of open bays to accommodate aircraft; and a 100,000square-foot aircraft ramp. Most significantly, this training center will consolidate TTC's Aeronautical Studies programs, which are currently housed in five buildings on two campuses. The \$79 million project has \$16 million remaining to be raised, thanks to our many economic development supporters, including the South Carolina legislature, which allocated \$21 million in the recent legislative session. Site work is already underway, and architectural bids are out for the design phase of the project.

This modern training facility will prepare the workforce for the region's rapidly growing number of suppliers and manufacturers, inspire future generations of aerospace workers who visit this site, and advance South Carolina as a true aerospace cluster.




"Heather had a really good job right away," Tony said. "There are a lot of strong programs at TTC that have great opportunities like that."
